

Caring for your flag

Assembly Instructions. Teardrop and Windblade.




1 Assemble poles

Assemble the poles by slotting the matching ends firmly together from fattest to thinnest. Large, 4 poles; medium, 3 poles; small, 2 poles.



2 Insert pole into flag

Feed the poles from the tip end completely through the pocket that runs up the side of the flag.



3 Insert pole into base

Slide the cavity at the bottom of the pole over the shaft of the base. Friction holds it securely in place.



4 Attach cord

Pull the draw cord over the hook on the pole to provide tension. Do not over-tension.

What reduces the life of your flag?



UV EXPOSURE

The sun's UV rays cause the dye to fade. The colours fade at different rates so they won't necessarily fade in a uniform fashion.



WIND

Flags exposed to regular windy conditions will deteriorate faster. The friction speeds up the process of the fibres breaking down.



OBSTRUCTION

If your flag is impeded from flying freely then it will be subjected to extra stress and will deteriorate faster.

Life expectancy for your flag is 6 to 12 months. Flags in coastal areas will deteriorate the fastest. You should plan to change your flag annually.

Extend the life of your flag

- Ensure it flies free of obstructions or tangles.
- Bring it in at night, or when not needed.
- Bring it in during bad weather.

Washing instructions

- Cold wash in mild detergent.
- Do not bleach.
- Do not soak.
- Hang up immediately.
- Do not tumble dry.
- Do not dry clean.
